Batteries re-charged, early October will see Archives purr back into gear after the same three-month period of hibernation.


Archives teams on Tuesdays and Thursdays continue refining details of the Fairfax photographs and the

Insight Number 26 was an interesting article on the auction of "Beleura-on-the-Sea" on the 8th of January 1916.

It sounded more like a party than a serious property sale as people were encouraged to bring a picnic and even hot water would be provided to make a pot of tea. (Our neighbours hired a Coffee Van when their house was auctioned and we met many people in the street we hadn't met before, all sipping on free Lattes and Long Blacks!)

There was even a specially scheduled train for attendees! Over 500 people were reported to have travelled to the auction on the special train but Amelia and George Tallis upstaged them all by arriving in a very unusual and expensive car.

Thank goodness they purchased the mansion Beleura and also significant amounts of the surrounding land and then filling Beleura with their interesting artefacts and art works to which John Tallis added even more.

So, now we are the beneficiaries of all the owners of Beleura – Butchart who built it, Bright and Jenner who added on the kitchen, tower and extra rooms, Smith who put in the leadlight windows and Edwick

who added the hydronic central heating, salt water supply to the main bathroom and even an electric lighting generator plant.

No wonder Julie Edgar depicted John Tallis smiling contentedly like a proud grandfather in her bronze portrait sculpture as he watches the guests happily walking back from their tours. What a wonderful privilege we have to share it with all the new (and sometimes been many times before) guests.
